World Duchenne Awareness Day observed

The First World Duchenne Awareness Day was observed at MDCRC here on Sunday.

Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy is devastating, threatening genetic neuromuscular disorder affecting boys. Concerted and focused efforts are required to prevent this disorder in our society. The vast majority of Duchenne patients are boys and young men who progressively lose their physical functions before they inevitably die of this cruel disease. Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy is one of the most common fatal genetic disorders which affects on average 1 in every 3500 newborn boys, with very few girls suffering from the disease.

Boys affected with Duchenne first lose the ability to walk during their clitidiood days and as they grow into adolescents they also lose the ability to use their arms, carry out everyday activities such as writing or feeding themselves, and their ability to breathe deteriorates as well. As they grow into young men they finally succumb to the disease and die due to respiratory problems or

heart failure. Majority do no reach adulthood at all.

As the disorder does not have cure till date, MDCRC has embarked its collaboration with The Arya Vaidya Pharmacy (AVP), to understand the therapeutic advantage that Ayurveda can offer under the able leadership of Dr.K.G.Raveen dran & team. The response to this initiative is encouraging and promises to offer better quality of life to the affected children.

In commemoration of World Duchenne Aware ness Day, MDCRC had organized a free Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy screening camp on 7th September 2014, at Kurinji Hospital, Nava India, Coimbatore. Before the inauguration of the camp, there was a short program understand the significance of this day. District Coimbatore collector, Mrs. Archana Patnaik, IAS delivered a special address at the gathering after hoisting the National flag at Kurinji. Duchenne awareness day logo was transformed into a flag at MDCRC and hoisted by Dr. KC Ramaswami, the Chairman of Kurinji Hospital, Coimbatore.
